### **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

**Prerequisite: None**

**Blended learning is a combination of classroom and online learning where online learning replaces *some* classroom instruction. Blended courses provide some of the conveniences of online courses without the complete loss of face-to-face contact. The majority of instruction will take place in the classroom.**

**The regular days for meeting at Camp Lejeune in the classroom are Tuesdays. Please check the class schedule below for exceptions.**

**Course Description:** This course will provide an in depth analysis of criminality, including the etiology (origin) of crime, and the extent and nature of crime within American society. The primary theories of criminality will be critiqued. (Campbell 2011-2013 Online Catalog).

**Learning Outcomes:** Upon completion of this course, the student should be able to:

- Describe the biological and psychological factors that contribute to crime and deviance within our society today.
- Identify the major theories of crime causation.

- Describe the role of social policy in the area of crime control. Explain the role of criminological research in the establishment in crime control policy
- Discuss the three eras have characterized the field of criminology over the past 100 years.
- Explain the major principles of the Classical School of criminology.
- Describe the assumptions underlying the practice of criminal psychological profiling and the validity of the process.
- Discuss the implications of the social developmental theories in developing social policy initiatives.
- Discuss the implications of criminological theories within the context of social policy.
- Explain the relationship of criminology to criminal justice.
- Identify major crime trends and patterns in the United States.

### **Expectation of Students**

Each week via Blackboard, information regarding two or more chapters will be presented. Additionally there are assignments posted on a weekly basis (Tuesday through Monday) with the due date being for Monday evening. See the syllabus for specific information.

Exams will cover all required chapters, assigned readings, and instructor presentations. The student may bring into the examination a two page study guide (front and back, OR, front of two separate pages) study guide either typed in any font or hand written. Each exam will be worth 100 points. The final is not comprehensive. The examination will consist of almost entirely of multiple choice questions.

There will be a total of two short papers and one term paper. All written material must be submitted electronically to the instructor in a word processing document. Documents ending in .doc, .docx, or the WordPerfect formats can be easily open. If you have a different word processing program, go to “File/Save As” and save as a “rtf” file which is an universal file. **Upload your file** under the Blackboard tab, Assignments/Videos then “Upload Papers Here”.

Please label your paper as “Last name, term paper” using your last name (first name too if you have a very common last name) then the paper requirement, e.g., “Smith, Ann—Research Article 1” or “Lewandowski--Term Paper”.

All papers will be submitted in APA format (Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association, Sixth Edition). Additional information regarding technical writing in an APA format can be found on Blackboard under external links.

Each of the two short papers will be approximately 1 ½ pages in length (not counting the title page and reference page) and will be a summary of a research article completed on a concept of criminal justice/criminology. The two research or review of the literature articles shall be on different concepts. The Campbell online library has “full text” articles. These are the entire research article rather than a summary. The online library can be accessed through the Campbell Blackboard, clicking the library tab on the upper right of the screen. Or the library can be access via the Campbell main website (Academics/libraries/Carrie Rich/databases then choose the Sage database (or on

some topics, PsyArticles database). [Use your Blackboard name and password to enter the database.] Once in the database use a key word(s) to find articles, e.g. victimization, death penalty, Moffitt's biosocial theory. Remember that the LESS key words you use, the more articles will appear. Always choose the "full text" option, otherwise you obtain only a summary of the article. Your summary of the full article should review the hypothesis being addressed, the type of subjects used, the method, the summary of the data, and discussion. Ask your instructor if you have difficulty determining whether an article is a research article, review of the literature, or editorial (editorial will NOT be accepted). A research article will indicate the subject or variables correlated; a review of the literature will involve a summary of all research or legal cases that had been completed at the time the review was written. Total points: 40 (20 per paper).

The term paper will be approximately 6-8 pages in length excluding title and reference page. The paper will contain at least six references, two of which need to be references from a scientific journal. The other references can include your text book, governmental websites or other professional websites. Wikipedia WILL NOT be an acceptable reference. Total points: 60.

There will be 10 questions submitted during the course on the Discussion Boards. Students are expected to respond within the time frame. Students should respond with an initial response by Monday midnight during the week due (except for Week 1 & 2), then respond to two other students' responses by the next Monday. After the due date, the discussion will still be able to be reviewed, but will be penalized for lateness at -3 per discussion board. Each will be a maximum of 9 points per question.

There will also be 6 "Muddiest Concept" discussion boards where you will indicate those concepts which are unclear to you. If the concepts in the chapters and video are clear to you, indicate this fact on the board. These boards are worth 2 points apiece with a -1 for lateness. Students are not required to respond to other students' responses; however if another student is puzzled regarding a concept which is clear to you, feel free to assist the other student. Lateness is after Tuesdays when the discussion board is also due.

There will be 6 external links worth 2 points apiece with -1 for lateness.

Lateness for any discussion board or external links will not go into effect until the third week of the course to allow familiarization with Blackboard and ensure that the student has a textbook.

**NO paper/assignment will be accepted after last day when the class meets for the final examination.** . No "incomplete" for the course will be given unless prior arrangements have been made with the instructor with documentation of the unusual request (e.g., medical emergencies with physician's order, military orders).

Blackboard allows the students to present personal information regarding themselves to allow other classmates to know something about them and to increase the feeling of community. Minimal requirements would number of courses previously taken at Campbell, major, anticipated graduation, and career plans. Encouraged would be more

personal information that your fellow students may find of interest—where you were raised, current family, type of work you are doing, relationship to the military as well as hobbies. 2 points for the minimal requirements. 1 point bonus for attaching a picture.

The nature of this class relies heavily on information developed, expanded, and initiated during class discussions both in person and over the forums in Blackboard. Participation is expected from all students and students are graded on participation. Each student is expected to read the assigned chapter prior to class.
