## FROM THE DIRECTOR

WELCOME to **Campbell University** and to the Extended Campus at Camp Lejeune/MCAS New River and the Jacksonville office site! Campbell University was ranked by The Princeton Review.com as one of the Best Colleges in the Southeast in its 2008 school selections. The accreditation and reputation of the school you attend for higher education is a very serious matter. Potential employers consider the quality of the institution you attended to receive your undergraduate and/or graduate degrees. You have made a wise decision to attend Campbell University.

Our Camp Lejeune extended campus offers several degree options for our students. Our most popular programs are Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) with majors in Business Administration and Accounting. The Bachelor of Science in Psychology is also very popular. In the Fall, 2008, we instituted a new degree program, Bachelor of Science in Information Technology and Security. A student can concentrate in one of two areas: Information Security or Information Technology management. We also added a Criminal Justice major to our curriculum. Students with certified technical training (military) or prior education from an accredited community and/or technical school may be interested in our Bachelor of Applied Science degree program. Each of these programs can be completed at our local campus.

You will find that our programs and classes are designed for the adult student. Most of our students work during the day. We offer evening classes, Saturday classes, lunchtime classes, distance education classes and blended (part classroom and part internet) classes to accommodate the needs of our students.

Several financial aid options are available to each Campbell student. The active duty Spouse Appreciation Scholarship will pay over one-half tuition for eligible spouses. Ask about these options when you speak with the Campbell counselor.

### All First Time Students

New students must see a Campbell University counselor before registering for any classes. **Active Duty military must see Base Education before meeting with a Campbell counselor to have their MINI-TABE score verified. Active Duty military attending college for the first time, must complete COLLEGE 101 presented by Base Education.**

**Registration:** Registration dates are found in the Academic Calendar (attached). Registration is held in Building 825, Base Education Center, Camp Lejeune, and at the MCAS Education Center. **Students are required to meet individual course pre-requisites, if required, prior to enrollment. Campbell University reserves the right to limit enrollment and to cancel classes with insufficient enrollment.**

**Tuition:** Tuition costs are **\$195.00** per semester hour for all undergraduate courses. This is subject to increase without prior notice. **\*NOTE: Internet Courses are \$250.00 per semester hour and are subject to increase without prior notice.**

**Financial Aid:** Active-duty military personnel can use Tuition Assistance (TA), which may pay up to 100% of tuition depending upon the availability of Tuition Assistance Funds. Active-duty personnel must apply for TA each eight or nine week term they are enrolled at Campbell University. NCLTG (available during Fall I and Spring I registration ONLY) and Pell Grant Applications are available at [www.fafsa.ed.gov](http://www.fafsa.ed.gov) Information on financial aid, the University's Military Spouse Appreciation Scholarship, and the Military Spouse Career Advancement Account can be obtained by speaking with Mrs. Patricia Frazier, Business Manager. (910-451-3097)

**Veterans Affairs:** **New VA students MUST see the VA Certifying Official prior to registering for courses. Office Hours- Mon-Thurs-9 am-2 pm.** Continuous VA students should register on the first day possible in order to insure current certification to the VA. Notify the VA Certifying Official when you register. All VA students who have missed a term must see the VA Certifying Official upon returning registration. All active duty personnel and visiting students desiring VA MUST see the Certifying Official prior to registering each term. All VA students mark VA on all registrations and drop/add forms. All VA students must see the Certifying Official upon withdrawal or receiving an "F" grade. VA students will be provided a degree plan as soon as their formal evaluation of transfer credits has been completed upon receipt of all transcripts. Only courses required for your degree can be certified for benefits. Required last day of the month verification by the student to the VA can be completed by the VA Web Automated Verification of Enrollment (WAVE) or Automated Telephone System 1-877-823-2378. All VA students must keep the Certifying Official informed of your registration status and any changes. Failure to do this may result in overpayments and non receipt of allowance due. If you change your enrollment, drop courses, withdraw from courses, or stop attending classes, or cease participating in internet courses, you may have to repay all or part of your VA Educational Benefits. Always see the VA Certifying Official if you have mitigating circumstances beyond your control. All VA students should visit the VA web site at [www.gibill.va.gov](http://www.gibill.va.gov) for up to date information on VA benefits.

**Dropping a course:** DROPPING a course **must** be completed on-line or at the Campbell offices **before the first week of the term ends. If a student wishes to drop all classes for which they have registered, they must do so in person. Due to problems incurred with the interface in Web Access, it is recommended that students who drop classes do so in person.** Students who drop courses during the Add/Drop or Drop Only period may receive a full refund of tuition. Dates and time for the Add/Drop are found in the Academic Calendar of Events. Students who wish to withdraw from a course after the add-drop period, must contact the Campbell University Camp Lejeune Office. A withdrawal is academic in nature, and will be a grade. Students who withdraw from classes are financially responsible for those courses.

**Textbooks:** You **must** now order your text books online. This can be done very easily using our on-line bookstore. A separate handout will be provided for this purpose.

### **Visiting Students**

If you are seeking a degree from another institution, you will be classified as a visiting student with Campbell University. You must provide a visiting student letter or valid SOC agreement from your home institution in order to register with Campbell. Visiting students who wish to use VA benefits must see the VA Certifying Official.

### **Independent/Directed Study Requests:**

Students desiring to take an IS/DS must contact the Campbell receptionist **FIRST** to obtain the request form. **DO NOT ATTEMPT TO GAIN INSTRUCTOR APPROVAL.** Approval and Instructor assignment is at the discretion of the Academic Director. Independent/Directed Studies are normally restricted to the last two terms prior to graduation and are used as a last resort measure to achieve graduation eligibility.

### **Environmental Science Saturday Lab Trips**

All Environmental Science Courses include Saturday Field Trips during the term. You cannot register for a Saturday Class if you are also registering for an Environmental Science Class on any weeknight.

### **Course Overload Requests:**

Ten or more semester hours per term or 19 or more semester hours in a semester is a Course Overload and must be approved by the Academic Director before registering.

### **On-line Registration-Fall 2009**

\* **Eligibility Criteria:** To register online you must meet the following criteria:

- Must be a degree-seeking student with Campbell University- Home campus is Camp Lejeune.
- Must have completed a minimum of 6 semester hours of Campbell University course work.
- Must have a GPA of 2.00, or better, for all course work completed at Campbell University.
- Must have a completed formal Evaluation of Transfer Credit and Degree Checklist from Campbell University.
- Your financial account with Campbell must be clear and up-to-date. The only unpaid charges should be those associated with approved Military, State, or Federal financial aid that has not yet posted to your account.
- You may not register for an on-line class if you have not taken one before. You can register for all of your in class classes but not the on-line course. You must come into the office in order to be registered for on-line. (Only if this is your first time taking an on-line course)

### **Withdrawal During Term:**

If you withdraw from one or more courses or receive a non-punitive grade (a grade that does not count toward graduation) for a course, you may have to repay all education benefits that you have received for that course, unless there were mitigating circumstances for the withdrawal or non-punitive grade. Mitigating circumstances are unavoidable events beyond your control which directly interfere with your education; there are unexpected, unplanned, or unavoidable events.

### **GRADUATION WITH HONORS**

The award of honors at Campbell University is determined in accordance with the following rules:

1. The GPA on all work at Campbell University must equal the stated GPA requirement.
2. To be eligible for honors at graduation, any student must have completed a minimum of 60 semester hours at Campbell University
3. Students who achieve a grade point average of 3.40 will be graduated cum laude, 3.60 magna cum laude, and 3.90 summa cum laude
4. Students electing to apply the Eight-Year Academic forgiveness policy are ineligible for honors.

**Inclement Weather**

There are times when classes are canceled due to circumstances such as a hurricane, snow, etc. "Whenever MCB Camp Lejeune closes for essential personnel only because of weather conditions, all Camp Lejeune and Jacksonville classes will be cancelled." When classes are canceled, the information will be broadcast on WITN-TV 7, WNCT-TV 9, WCTI-TV 12, WSFL 106.5, and WJNC 1240 AM. Most local radio and television stations will announce the closing of the Base.



**BLENDED CLASS INFORMATION** - Blended learning is a combination of classroom and online learning where online learning replaces *some* classroom instruction. Blended courses provide some of the conveniences of online courses without the complete loss of face-to-face contact. The majority of instruction will take place in the classroom.

For VA STUDENTS USING CHAPTER 33-See VA Certifying Official prior to registration for all classes.

***VA students who have elected the Post 9/11 G I Bill Chapter 33 must be in at least one 3 s h class that meets entirely in the class room and one other 3 s h course for Monthly Housing Allowance purposes (BAH)***

- .. Blended classes meet one night per week, or as noted in the class schedule. (Lunch-time classes meet two-three days per week)
- .. Non-classroom assignments are conducted over the internet.
- .. To take a blended course requires access to a personal computer, internet access, and may require other hardware or software prescribed by the instructor.
- .. Students are required to use their Campbell e-mail address in conjunction with a blended class.
- .. Students in a blended class are loaded to the Blackboard course site on Friday before the term begins, and continually throughout the Add/Drop period, by the campus conducting the course.
- .. Using their Common User Name and Password, students can access the course site immediately if the course has been made available by the instructor.
- .. Students should check the course site for assignments on the first day of the term. Students are responsible for any assignments prior to the first class meeting.
- .. Students experiencing difficulty accessing a blended course site should contact the Academic Director (451-3097).

## DISTANCE EDUCATION SCHEDULE-ADDED 23 JUNE

For VA STUDENTS USING CHAPTER 33-

***VA students who have elected the Post 9/11 G I Bill Chapter 33 must be in at least one 3 s h class that meets entirely in the class room and one other 3 s h course for Monthly Housing Allowance purposes (BAH)***

### Information:

- Students may not take more than **15 hours** of online Distance Education courses towards an **Associate in Arts** degree.
- Students may not take more than **30 hours** of online Distance Education courses towards a **Bachelors** Degree.
- You must have a Campbell GPA of 2.0 and completed six semester hours of traditional courses to take online courses.
- The syllabus and textbook lists will be posted on the Distance Education page on our website a week before registration.
- Students must have a functional Campbell University e-mail account and use **Web Access**. *The Blackboard user name and password is the same as your Web Access user name and password.*
- Students that have registered will be automatically loaded into Blackboard each day.
- Students are limited to a maximum of one DE class (3 or 4 hours) the first term they take an internet class. Thereafter students may take up to two classes a semester. Any exceptions will have to have the approval of your adviser and the Dean of Extended Campus.
- **You will be able to view your class the Wednesday before the first day of class.**

Students are asked to participate in an online course orientation. After you login to Blackboard you need to self-enroll in the orientation site. Follow the directions below.

### Self-enroll in Student Orientation

1. Go to Blackboard, located at <http://www.blackboard.campbell.edu/>
2. Click the [**login**] button.
3. Enter your username (same as your Web Access username) and your Blackboard password. (Web Access password) Click [**login**] to enter Blackboard.
4. Once you are logged in, click the [**Community**] tab at the top of the screen.
5. Use the Organization Search box to type in **Student Orientation**. Then click on the orange GO.
6. To enroll click the [**Enroll**] button to the right of the orientation. You may have to scroll to the right in order to see it. Do not click directly on the course name.
7. On the Self Enrollment screen click [**Submit**]. You will receive confirmation that your enrollment was successful.
8. Click [**OK**] to enter the orientation.

The Student Orientation will now display in your "My Organizations" section when you log in to Blackboard.
