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FROM THE DIRECTOR:

WELCOME to **Campbell University** and the Extended Campus at Camp Lejeune! Campbell University was ranked by The Princeton Review.com as one of the Best Colleges in the Southeast in its 2011 school selections, and selected by G.I. Jobs as a Military Friendly School. The accreditation and reputation of the school you attend for higher education is a very serious matter. Potential employers consider the quality of the institution you attended to receive your undergraduate and/or graduate degrees. You have made a wise decision to attend Campbell University.

Our Camp Lejeune extended campus offers several degree options for our students. Our most popular programs are Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) with majors in Business Administration and Accounting, the Bachelor of Science in Psychology. In the Fall, 2008, we instituted a new degree program, Bachelor of Science in Information Technology and Security. A student can concentrate in one of two areas: Information Security or Information Technology management. We also added a Criminal Justice major to our curriculum. Students with certified technical training (military) or prior education from an accredited community and/or technical school may be interested in our Bachelor of Applied Science degree program. Each of these programs can be completed at our local campus.

You will find that our programs and classes are designed for the adult student. Most of our students work during the day. We offer evening classes, Saturday classes, lunchtime classes, distance education classes and blended (part classroom and part internet) classes to accommodate the needs of our students.

Several financial aid options are available to each Campbell student. The active duty Spouse Appreciation Scholarship will pay over one-half tuition for eligible spouses. Ask about these options when you speak with the Campbell counselor.

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Please review the following policies and procedures very carefully

First time students: New students must see a Campbell University counselor before registering for any classes. **Active Duty military must see Base Education before meeting with a Campbell counselor to have their MINI-TABE score verified. Active Duty military attending college for the first time, must complete COLLEGE 101 presented by Base Education.**

Visiting Students: If you are seeking a degree from another institution, you will be classified as a visiting student with Campbell University. You must provide a visiting student letter or valid SOC agreement from your home institution in order to register with Campbell. Visiting students who wish to use VA benefits must see the VA Certifying Official.

Registration: Registration dates are found in the Academic Calendar. Registration is held in Building 825, Base Education Center, Camp Lejeune, and at the MCAS Education Center (Mondays only). **Students are required to meet individual course pre-requisites, if required, prior to enrollment. Campbell University reserves the right to limit enrollment and to cancel classes with insufficient enrollment.**

Tuition: Tuition costs are **\$225.00** per semester hour for all undergraduate courses. This is subject to increase without prior notice. ***NOTE: Internet Courses are \$250.00 per semester hour and are subject to increase without prior notice.**

Financial Aid: Active-duty military personnel can use Tuition Assistance (TA), which may pay up to 100% of tuition depending upon the availability of Tuition Assistance Funds. Active-duty personnel must apply for TA each eight or nine-week term they are enrolled at Campbell University. NCLTG (available during Fall I and Spring I registration ONLY) and Pell Grant applications are available at www.fafsa.ed.gov. Information on financial aid, the University's Military Spouse Appreciation Scholarship, and the Military Spouse Career Advancement Account (MyCAA) can be obtained by speaking with Mrs. Patricia Frazier, Business Manager. Veterans Affairs: Office hours for the SCO are Mon. - Thurs. 9:00 – 3:00 and Friday from 9:00 – 1:00. **New students** using VA Benefits **MUST** see the School Certifying Official to register for courses. A degree plan will be provided when all transcripts are received and the formal evaluation of transfer credits has been completed. The new student will also be certified at that time. It may take 45 – 60 days for benefits to begin, but you will receive back pay to your first day of class.

Current Students must notify the SCO when registering for classes.

Online registrations will not be certified unless the SCO is notified by email. Please forward a copy of the online registration confirmation email with the specific courses you have registered for, including the course number, name and delivery method (online, blended, classroom.)

Chapter 30 (MGIB) students must verify enrollment with the VA no sooner than the last day of each month via the WAVE system.

Chapter 33 (Post 9-11) must maintain full time status (two classes/term) to be eligible for housing. To receive the maximum housing allowance, one of the two classes must meet entirely in the classroom. The other course can be blended or online. Two blended classes/term **WILL NOT** fulfill the classroom requirement.

You will only be certified for courses required for your degree plan.

You must notify the SCO when making ANY changes to your schedule (drop/add/withdraw)

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Dropping a course: Once a course has begun, courses can only be dropped during the first week of the term (see dates in schedule). Failure to properly drop a course may cause you to earn an “F” grade and you will be responsible for the cost of the course. If a student wishes to drop classes for which they have registered, they must do so in person at the Camp Lejeune Office. Students who DROP during the Add/Drop or Drop Only period may receive a full refund of tuition.

Course Withdrawal: Students, who wish to withdraw from a course after the add/drop period, must contact the Campbell University Camp Lejeune Office. A withdrawal is academic in nature, and a grade will be required from the instructor (WP or WF). Students who withdraw from classes are financially responsible for these courses.

Textbooks: The Camp Lejeune Campus does not have a bookstore. You may order your text books via our online bookstore. Visit www.campbellcampjeune and follow the links. Other online options are available as well, such as textbook rental. A separate handout is available upon request for more information regarding textbook purchase.

Inclement Weather: Classes will be cancelled anytime Camp Lejeune closes due to inclement weather (i.e. a condition of “essential personnel” only.) Base closure is advertised on most local radio and television stations. You may also call (910) 451-1717 for up-to-the-minute updates. Cancellations are also posted to the website, www.campbellcampjeune.com.

Course Overload Requests: Ten or more semester hours per term or 19 or more semester hours in a semester is a course overload and must be approved by the Academic Director before registering.

Independent/Directed Study Requests: Students desiring to take an IS/DS must contact the Campbell Receptionist FIRST to obtain the request form. DO NOT ATTEMPT TO GAIN INSTRUCTOR APPROVAL. Approval and Instructor assignment is at the discretion of the Academic Director/Director. Independent/Directed Studies are normally restricted to the last two terms prior to graduation and are used as a last resort measure to achieve graduation eligibility.

Environmental Science Saturday Lab Trips: All Environmental Science Courses include Saturday field trips during the term. You cannot register for a Saturday class if you are also registering for an Environmental Science Class on any weeknight.

Graduation with Honors: The award of honors at Campbell University is determined in accordance with the following rules:

1. The student must have completed a minimum of 64 semester hours at Campbell University
2. Students who achieve a grade point average of 3.40 will be graduated cum laude, 3.60 magna cum laude, and 3.90 summa cum laude
3. Students electing to apply the Eight-Year Academic Forgiveness policy are ineligible for honors.

BLENDED AND ONLINE COURSE INFORMATION:

BLENDED CLASS INFORMATION - Blended learning is a combination of classroom and online learning where online learning replaces *some* classroom instruction. Blended courses provide some of the conveniences of online courses without the complete loss of face-to-face contact. The majority of instruction will take place in the classroom.

-Blended classes meet one night per week, or as noted in the class schedule. (Lunch-time classes meet two days per week)

-Non-classroom assignments are conducted via the internet.

-Requirements include access to a personal computer, internet access, and may other hardware or software as prescribed by the instructor.

-Blended classes are open to all students in good academic standing.

-Students are required to use their Campbell e-mail address in conjunction with a blended class.

-The online component of blended classes is facilitated via the Blackboard website. Student enrollment information is uploaded to Blackboard the Friday before the term begins and continually throughout the Add/Drop period, by the campus conducting the course.

-Using their Common User Name and Password, students can access the course site as soon as the course has been made available by the instructor. The instructor is not required to make the course available until the Friday before the term begins.

-Students in blended classes that meet on Wednesdays or later in the week should expect to have some type of course work required in the Blackboard site before the first class meeting.

-Students should check the course site for assignments on the first day of the term. Students are responsible for any assignments prior to the first class meeting.

-Students experiencing difficulty accessing a blended course site should contact their home campus.

DISTANCE EDUCATION (ONLINE COURSE) INFORMATION – Distance education courses are conducted solely online and do not have a classroom component

-To be eligible to take online courses, students must meet the following requirements:

*Campbell GPA of 2.0 and successful completion of six semester hours of traditional courses

*A functional Campbell University e-mail account and use of Web Access

-Student enrollment information will be automatically loaded into Blackboard each day.

-Students are limited to a maximum of one DE course (3 or 4 hours) per term. Any exceptions must be approved by the Campus Director and the Associate Dean (Main Campus requires the approval of the student's academic adviser and the Associate Dean of Extended Campus.)

-Students are asked to participate in an online course orientation.

To enroll in the online course orientation:

1. Go to Blackboard, located at <http://www.blackboard.campbell.edu/>
2. Click the **[login]** button
3. Enter your username and password. *Blackboard and Web Access use the same username and password.*
4. Click **[login]**
5. Once you are logged in, click **[Community]** at the top of the screen
6. Type "**Student Orientation**" into the Organization Search box. Click the orange **GO**
7. To enroll, click **[Enroll]** to the right of the orientation. You may have to scroll to the right in order to see the button. Do not click directly on the course name.
8. On the Self Enrollment screen click **[Submit]**. You will receive confirmation that your enrollment was successful.

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9. Click [OK] to enter the orientation.

The Student Orientation will now display in your "My Organizations" section when you log in to Blackboard
